




Fig. #4 My Grandparents, My Parents, and I (Family Tree) (1936).




Fig. #6 The Broken Column (1944). Fundacion Dolores Olmedo, Mexico City.




Fig. #7 My Birth (1932). Private Collection, USA.




Fig. #8 Remembrance of an Open Wound (1938). Isidore Ducasse Fine Arts, USA.
